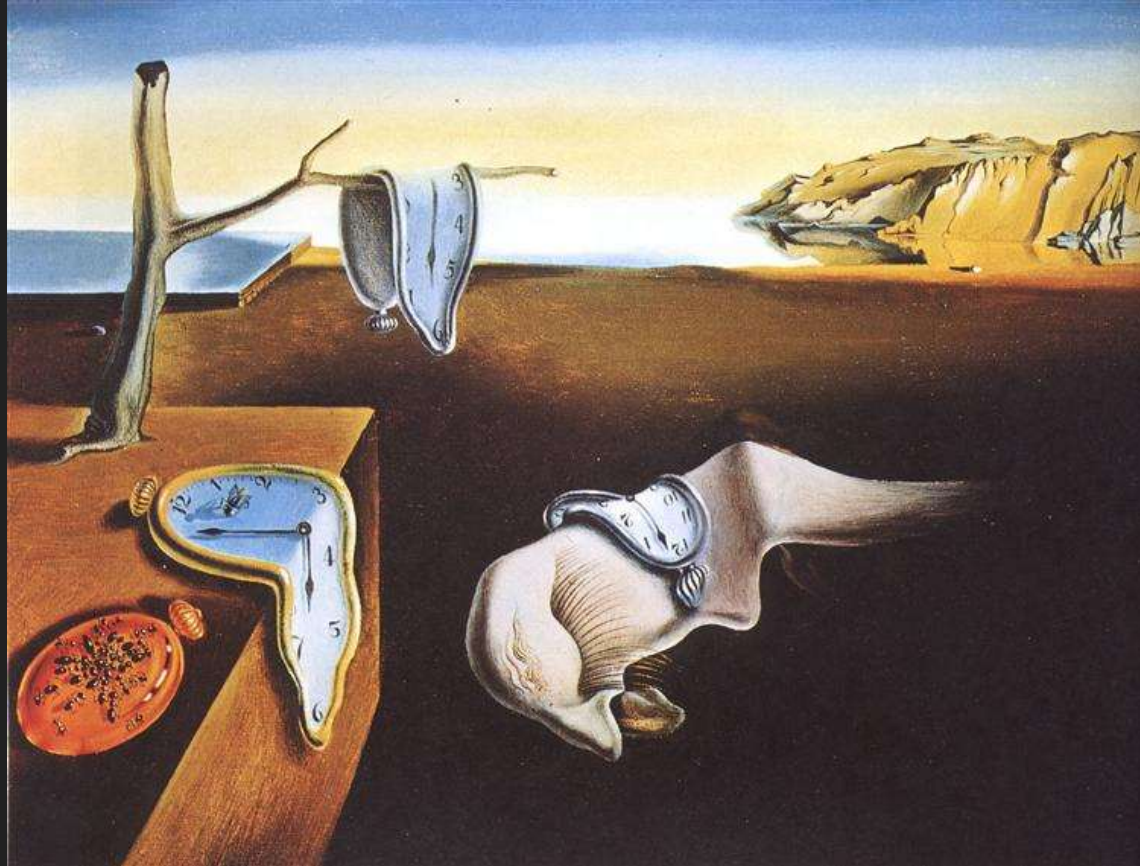
# Modernism

- Modern art is a term used to describe the artworks produced in the period from around the 1860s to the 1970s.
- Modernism fostered a period of experimentation in the arts from the late 19th to the mid-20th century, particularly in the years following [World War I](#).
- In an era characterized by [industrialization](#), the nearly global adoption of capitalism, rapid [social change](#), and advances in [science](#) and the [social sciences](#), Modernists felt a growing alienation.
- New ideas in psychology, [philosophy](#), and political theory kindled a search for new modes of expression.

# Modernism

- Avant-garde movements including Impressionism, Cubism, Expressionism, Abstract Expressionism are generally defined as *Modernist*.
- Over the span of these movements, artists increasingly focused on the intrinsic qualities of their art such as line, form, and colour—and moved away from inherited notions of art.

# Antoni Gaudí

- Gaudí's work is a remarkable reflection of all different facets of society and has a unique and singular character.
- In fact, his works are particularly associated with *Modernisme*, and in this sense, Gaudí can be regarded as the most representative and outstanding of the *Modernista* architects.

# La Sagrada Familia

- Gaudí took over as chief architect in 1882, transforming the project with his architectural and engineering style, combining Gothic and curvilinear Art Nouveau forms.
- Gaudí devoted the remainder of his life to the project. At the time of his death in 1926, less than a quarter of the project was complete.

# La Sagrada Familia

- 135 years after the laying of the first stone, construction continues on the Basilica.
- In the years since Gaudi's death, **nine architects** have taken on the project only to later walk away due to project's numerous obstacles.
- Projected to be completed in 2026.
